





Dissemination Meeting - JTF

The Japanese Trust Fund (JTF) project has finally come to the end by making a meaningful impact in the communities. The project entitled "Enhancing availability and Women's Access to Integrated SRH-HIV

services in earthquake affected districts of Nepal" was implemented from October 2019 to September 2021 in three districts; Kavre, Kathmandu and Makwanpur .

The dissemination program was formally started by Project Coordinator Ms. Narayani Tripathi- by welcoming all the participants. The Program was chaired by Administrator of FPAN, Dr. Naresh Pratap KC. Key speakers for the program were Program Director, Project Coordinator, OLE manager, Branch Managers & Peer Educators, from all operational districts and consultants Dr. Jhabindra Bhandari & Mr. Prabhu Poudel

Program Director Mr. Subhash Chandra Shrestha gave a brief background of the project from designing phase to implementation and close out. Branch managers from operational districts shared the key achievements and learnings from this project along with the challenges. Dr Jhabindra was one of the most excited people among the participants to see the progress made by the project as he was involved during the mid-term assessment and at that time the project had made only 40% achievement due to strict lockdown.

Key achievements of JTF project were successful completion of all the targeted activities with reaching the achievements by double of its targets on service delivery, engagement of PE and RHFVs as a model, PE capacity development through the trainings, conduction of trainings in different slots especially on MISP, STI case management and MNCH to service providers. Project has been successful to enhance the capacity building of service providers, RHFV, & PEs. Different IEC/BCC materials were developed, and mass media mobilization was done during the project period. Although the project was implemented in COVID-19 situation, it was able to coordinate with major stakeholders for achieving its target and leaving its impact behind.
